ENGL 3352 NINETEENTH CENTURY AMERICAN FICTION

From the dark Romanticism of Poe to the early Modernism of Henry James, Nineteenth Century American Fiction will cover the remnants of Puritanism in Hawthorne, the beauty of nature in Cooper, the horrors of slavery in Douglass and Jacobs, the gradual reconstruction of womanhood in Freeman, Jewett, Miller, Chopin, and other topics of social, historical, and cultural interest. We will examine motivation, responsibility, traditions, as well as the status of slaves, the changing definitions of women, and the early rise of the Modern Era and the Industrial Revolution. With literature written in a century of change, we will be spectators, commentators, and interpreters of the movements we see reflected in the work and times.

Students will be expected to attend class regularly and come prepared to discuss the reading assignments of the day. Students will have reading responses to write, one oral presentation to give, a research paper to write, an annotated bibliography to create over one of the short story writers or one of the novels/novellas assigned, and a final exam to take in class.
