Spanish for the Global Professions Minor Proposal

A Proposal to Create a New Minor: Spanish for the Global Professions

The Minor in Spanish for the Global Professions is designed for students who anticipate careers in which they will need to interact with Hispanic communities in the U.S. or abroad and who wish to continue the study of Spanish language and culture for specific professional purposes: business, translation, education, and health. Students preparing for their professional lives often are not aware of the usefulness of knowledge of the Spanish language and Hispanic cultures across the professions within the United States. This Minor raises student awareness so that they might pursue Spanish for a specific profession before they are active professionals. Through this Minor, students derive their own answers to common questions such as: Why is there a language requirement at this university? What can I do with my Spanish when I've finished the language requirement?

Thus, our department respectfully requests an approval for a new Minor in Spanish for the Global Professions focusing in the areas of translation, business, education, and health. This initiative responds to the current demographic shifts in US population with an unprecedented ascendancy of the Hispanic minority and a higher demand for Spanish-language for effective communication with this growing population. We have several years of experience teaching Spanish for Business (we have offered classes in this area for over fifteen years, i.e. SPAN 3341,3342, etc.) and Translation (SPAN 3312, 4387) successfully. Starting in 2012, we offered two new courses, one on Spanish for the Professions (3339) and the other Spanish for Health (3343). These courses focus not only on developing the language tools but also in the cultural and pragmatic elements for effective communication, thus they cover a wide range of issues including historical, socioeconomic, and political aspects of migration, and their roots in Latin America, as well as the continued interactions between these groups and their home countries, and the impact on United States society.

Spanish for the Global Professions (SGP)

The Minor in **Spanish for the Global Professions** is designed for students who anticipate careers in which they will need to interact with Hispanic communities in the U.S. or abroad and who wish to continue the study of Spanish language and culture for specific professional purposes: business, translation & interpretation, and health. Students must complete 15 hours of advanced Spanish courses.
