UH Charter School COVID-19 Guidelines

This document is to provide the UH Charter School community with the guidelines that will be in place for the reopening of school in August. When developing these guidelines UH Charter School considered the recommendations from the University https://www.uh.edu/covid-19/, the Texas Education Agency https://www.uh.edu/covid-19/, the Texas Education Agency https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus-covid-19-support-and-guidance the America Academy of Pediatrics https://services.aap.org/en/pages/2019-novel-coronavirus-covid-19-infections/, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-novel/index.html, and the Harris County Public Health Department https://www.dshs.texas.gov/coronavirus/, and the Harris County Public Health Department https://www.dshs.texas.gov/coronavirus/.

UH Charter School also surveyed parents and staff to gather information to help in making final decisions regarding the re-opening of the school for the 2020-2021 school year.

UH Charter School staff also attended a number of training sessions specifically addressing re-opening of school procedures and protocols.

Changes to this guidance may occur should we receive additional information or direction from the University, the State of Texas, the Texas Education Agency and/or state of local health authorities. The guidance provided in the handbook is in effect unless you are notified in writing of added guidance and/or changes to the practices outlined in this document.

We know that the education and safety of your child is your main concern and it is ours as well. We want to provide you with information on the instructional program for the 2020-2021 school year and the protocols in place to ensure safety of all. The intent is to help you in making decisions for your child's educational program as we begin the 2020-2021 school year.

Our guiding principles for the document are:

Health and Safety of all (students, staff and the school community)

High quality instruction for all students - identify and meet the needs of all students

Provide mental health and wellness supports

Understanding the need for adjustments during the year

Health and safety:

As recommended by health authorities the wearing of face covering helps to mitigate the spread of germs. All students and staff will be required to wear face coverings.

Facemasks will be worn by all staff
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Facemasks will be worn by students entering and exiting the building and any time 6 feet distancing is not
possible
Face shields will be worn by students in the classrooms (provided by the school)
Office staff will wear facemasks when they are outside of their office or when someone is in the office.
Desk dividers will be used in the classrooms during all classroom activities
There will be no shared materials each student has their own supply case (provided by the school) with the
needed supplies for classroom use

Distancing of students will take place in the classroom to the extent possible Students will be assigned seats to minimize contact of surfaces and materials Students will remain in cohorts to minimize movement and contact. Students will remain in the classroom and teachers/staff will move into classroom (ancillary, grades 3-5)
mmended by health authorities limiting access to the building helps in mitigating the spread of COVID 19. owing are procedures to reduce building access.
Students will be dropped off curbside at the sidewalk by the red canopy Staff will be available to clear the student for check in Students must wear a face mask when entering and exiting the building and at all time when 6 feet distancing is not possible A daily self-check before coming to school is required for all students. Student temperatures will be checked daily. A staff member will conduct the temperature check. Students with a temperature of 100 + will be sent home and not allowed in the building and any student exhibiting COVID 19 symptoms will be excluded for the building (a list of Symptoms can be found at the end of this document in Appendix A) Any student who has been sick must have a doctor's note to return to school Students with fever must be fever free for 48 hours before returning to school with a doctor's note Staff must self-screen daily (a list of Symptoms can be found at the end of this document in Appendix A) Staff temperature check will be conducted daily Any staff member that has been sick must have a doctor's note to return to school/work
Only staff and students will have access to the building o Parents will not enter the building for drop off or pick up o Parent s will only be allowed access in an emergency situation (determined by administration) If early pick up is needed please follow these guidelines: contact the front desk at 713-743-9111 to notify the school on the early pick up to include day and time, when you arrive at school call the front desk and your child will be brought to you. Parents are to wait at the curb by the canopy for your child to be brought to you. (This procedure is outlined in the parent/student handbook page ?)
Gathering of the school will not occur (assemblies, field trips, etc.) Parent meetings and conferences will be conducted virtually – parents wishing to schedule a parent meeting can follow the procedures outlined in the parent/student handbook on page?)
Meals will be provided in classrooms not in the café – meals will be delivered to the classroom by school
personnel Student movement will be limited to restrooms and outdoor recess. Students will remain in their cohort group during the school day
Movement in the school will be redirected with an entrance door and an exit door. The entrance door will be the first door on the hall to the right and the exit doors will be the door by the main office.
Teachers will move to classroom to provide instruction (PE, Art, Music, grades 3-5) Stagger dismissal time to reduce numbers at dismissal. Dismissal schedule can be found in the parent/student handbook on page?

Students will be instructed in proper handwashing techniques.

	Students (and staff) will be trained on proper health and disease transmission prevention measures. Signage for proper hygiene practices will be posted throughout the building, in the restrooms, at the sinks
	and at the entrance. Hand sanitizers are available at school entrances, in all classrooms and throughout the school.
	Disinfect wipes are available in all classrooms and throughout the school. Surfaces will be wiped between

	Increased cleaning by UH Facilities will take place throughout the day. The CDC has provided guidance on cleaning buildings to prevent COVID-19 spread. (the building was deep cleaned before the start of the school year)

	We will immediately separate any student/staff who shows COVID-19 symptoms while at school until the student can be picked up by a parent or guardian. (We are using a small room on campus for this purpose) The areas used by the individual who shows COVID-19 symptoms while at school (student, teacher, or staff) will be cleaned as soon as is feasible. Any student who report feeling sick will be given an immediate temperature check to determine if they are symptomatic for COVID-19. Student/staff will not be allowed back to school with-out a doctor's note

	If the individual has symptoms that could be COVID-19 and wants to return to school before completing the above stay at home period, the individual must either (a) obtain a medical professional's note clearing the individual for return based on an alternative diagnosis or (b) receive two separate confirmations at least 24 hours apart that they are free of COVID via acute infection tests at an approved COVID-19 testing location found at https://tdem.texas.gov/covid-19/ .

Individuals with confirmed or suspected cases of COVID-19 must inform the school.

Individuals with Lab-Confirmed Cases Who Have Been in the School

If an individual who has been in the school is lab-confirmed to have COVID-19, the UHCS must notify
the University, its local health department, in accordance with applicable federal, state and local laws
and regulations, including confidentiality requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and
Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).
UHCS will close off areas that are heavily used by the individual with the lab-confirmed case (student,
teacher, or staff) until the non-porous surfaces in those areas can be disinfected, unless more than 3
days have already passed since that person was on campus.
Consistent with school notification requirements for other communicable diseases, and consistent with
legal confidentiality requirements, UHCS will notify all teachers, staff, and families of all students in a
school if a lab-confirmed COVID-19 case is identified among students, teachers or staff who participate
on any on campus activities

Instructional Programming

Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) are the standards that are at the foundation of the school curriculum. While UH Charter School is re-opening for face to face instruction on August 17, 2020; we understand that all parents may not be comfortable with sending their child to school when school opens. UH Charter School will provide face to face instruction and a remote instructional model beginning August 17, 2020. Planning for instruction has begun and parents will be provided with the students expectations and expectations will be posted on our website.

In planning for instruction UHCS will need to know who is returning to school for face to face instruction and who will participate in remote instruction. Parents will receive a survey on August 3, 2020 to make that commitment. Once a students has been committed to face to face instruction or remote instruction they remain in that instructional program through the 9 week grading period. Two weeks prior to the 9 week grading period parents may opt to change instructional programs by notifying Patricia Paquin at 713-743-8538 or ppaquin@uh.edu to request the change.

Face to face instruction:

Students report to school from 8 am to 3:45 pm Monday – Friday (except for the last Friday of each month)

Students participating in face to face instruction will participate in a blended instructional platform; which
involves in-person instruction and the use of the remote platform for some instructional activities. This will

APENNDIX A - COVID 19 SYMPTOMS

COVID-19 affects different people in different ways. Most infected people will develop mild to moderate illness and recover without hospitalization. People with COVID 19 have had a wide range of symptoms – ranging from mild to severe illness. *Symptoms may appear 2 – 14 days after exposure to the virus*.
