Spanish 1505 Intensive Elementary Spanish (Online course)

Course Description

Bienvenidos to Spanish 1505 Online! This is an Intensive Elementary Spanish **Online**, asynchronous, five-credit course that is part of the Spanish Language Program. It has been designed for students of Spanish as a Second Language who have no heritage knowledge of the language and be placed in this level by Placement Exam. By the end of this course, you will have acquired a novice mid/high knowledge of Spanish vocabulary and grammar, you will be able to communicate effectively at the basic level in general settings using Spanish, and, most importantly, you will begin to develop social responsibility, tolerance, and understanding of diversity and a nuanced understanding of the of the diversity and richness of the cultures and people of the Spanish-speaking world: from the basic knowledge to issues connected to history, politics, and cultural diversity.

ATTENTION: Asynchronous Online Courses (or asynchronous exam in another course format): This course is taught asynchronously, which means there is no designated day or time assigned to the course (although optional synchronous sessions are possible, such as virtual office hours or discussion groups). Asynchronous instruction generally involves accessing content, such as recorded video lectures, readings, discussion prompts, assignments, and assessments during a flexible time frame, with due dates as specified. This course will have a final project at the course conclusion. The project will be asynchronous, and the due date is in the course calendar.

Requirements

- Students must be independent and computer proficient to take this course.

Course Workload

Online activities

This course is taught completely online, and students have to work by themselves. The Instructor will answer questions in the Facebook Closed Class Group, and when necessary, she/he will send Anuncios in Blackboard and Facebook Closed Class Group. It is your responsibility to know all activity deadlines--do not wait for your instructor to send reminders. Read the class calendar in Blackboard and in the VHL Supersite.

You have access to a weekly calendar showing all assignments and their due dates in the VHL Supersite. It is imperative to study in the online textbook, watch the grammar and vocabulary tutorials, and complete all the homework. *All assignments are due at midnight*.

Active Participation in Facebook Closed Class Group

Students must participate in the *Facebook Closed Group*. In the **Facebook Closed Group** students will post:

- Answers to ASC
- Final Project
- Answers to activities created by the instructor
- Taking active part in this course is fundamental for your success, since an important percentage of your final grade depends on your performance (writing and speaking) in the target language.

Managing your time

As recommended by the University of Houston Undergraduate Catalog, any undergraduate student "should recognize that coursework in college will require a significant amount of work outside the classroom—traditionally 2-3 hours for every hour in class. That ratio will vary with subject, but the underlying principle will be: being in college is a time-consuming activity. Any other commitments while enrolled in college courses should be balanced against the time required to attend to one's college classes and assignments [...] Students living off-campus need to

allow time in their schedule for commuting. Working students need to consider how many hours remain in the 168 hours of the week after deducting time for eating, sleeping, recreation, and other extracurricular activities. 
Based on these considerations, success in this class requires that you dedicate the recommended time of 15-20 weekly hours to read, study and prepare assignments:

SPAN1505 Online = 5 credit-hours online per week + 2-3 homework for every hour in class = 15 - 20 hours of work per week (including studying, reading, practicing, homework, and test preparation)

Activities

Online Homework (25%) Online HW with VHL Supersite: The development of the language skills demands daily practice. This course requires completion of daily online assignments (detailed in your VHL Supersite Calendar). The homework activities listed in the VHL Supersite platform prepare you to obtain the most benefit from the class activities and also help you monitor your own progress learning Spanish. Each completed chapter is 5% of your grade.

- All homework should be completed by the date indicated on the schedule.
- Late submissions are accepted. The VHL system will take 5% off per late day. No complaints, the system is doing it automatically, if you do not want to lose 5% per late day, submit the homework on time. No late homework will be accepted after the end of a chapter.
- You will have three (3) attempts to complete the homework. Do not guess! Study the content first, and after studying, complete the activities. On Wednesdays, **Explore** and **Learn** activities are due, which will prepare you for the rest of the week's practice. Activities in VHL are due: Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays.
- At this level, accent marks, capitalization and punctuation are not graded, but student will see highlighter errors, it is enhanced feedback to let the students know their errors and mistakes.



- **Speaking Activities**: Students will have a brief oral exam on the same day of the quiz. This exam must be done in VHL Supersite and will be a Pronunciation activity.
- You can use the Language Commons (AH 215) to complete your online homework.
- Speaking and Partner Activities: Speaking activities which include a partner must be done in VHL Supersite with the voice recorder and a partner FROM THE CLASS. It is your responsibility to find a partner. Your instructor will share a document in Google Docs. Students will post their schedule availability and find a partner. Once you find a classmate that has the same availability as you, email him or her and set up a date and time to be on VHL Supersite at the same time.
- The voice recorder is very easy to use. You will have on average 1-2 per week. Do this in advance!
- If your partner has dropped or "disappeared," find a new partner in class. Your instructor will allow one set of activities (one chapter) to be done individually if you are in a bind. By the next chapter, you will need to have a partner. If you are going to record your one activity individually, you need to let the instructor know via email!
- Oral activities with a partner: start the activity saying your first and last name. Record the activity in a quiet space, no background noises, please!! Review the activity before to submit, VHL allows review. Instructors will give a zero if it is hard to listen to what a student is saying.

Actividades Socioculturales Críticas (ASC) (3 activities in Facebook = 14 %)

- There will be three socio-cultural activities (ASC) throughout the whole semester.
- Students will have to watch video clips, read texts, find some information, and write a post. All activities were created to promote critical thinking and cultural awareness and use real and current materials. All ASC count for your final grade. Be careful, read the instructions, take time to prepare these activities, and pay attention to avoid plagiarism: do not copy and paste your responses. Always quote your researched answers.

Compositions (2 writing assignments) (12%)

Students must complete 2 compositions. Each composition has a first version (draft) and final version, and it has to be completed in Turnitin, accessible via Blackboard.

- All instructions are in Blackboard > Folder Compositions. All writing is to be your own work. You may not seek tutoring or any other kind of help for the writing activities; only your instructor is authorized to give such help. Use of translation devices or services to complete a writing task is not allowed either. If the instructor, after comparing a student's composition with other written assignments, determines that the student received help or used an online translator to complete the composition, the student will receive an automatic zero. (Please refer to section 'On plagiarism')
- The compositions have two parts: The first draft and the final version. Students will write the draft, review the instructor feedback, make the corrections suggested by the instructor, complete the Ficha de errores, and submit the final version. If you have a grade of 94 or above, you do not need to submit the final version and your instructor will repeat the grade of the draft. If you have 93 or below, you must complete the final version, attach the Ficha de errores at the end of the composition, and submit through Turnitin.
- Not late submissions will be accepted.
- The final version of all compositions must have a minimum of 175-250 words. No excuse is accepted to write less than 175 words at this level.
- Do not use online translators. Translated compositions will be given an automatic zero.

Participation in Facebook class closed group (10%)

• Students will have to become a member of a Facebook class closed group, and participation is mandatory. Students should ask questions and answer other students' questions about challenging activities in the Facebook group. Also, students will complete activities created by your instructor.

Tests

- *Oral Production*. Your oral skills in Spanish will be assessed in a Mid-Semester test (10%), and in the Final Project wich includes an oral section (13%). Throughout the semester, students will have several oral activities in VHL.
- Quizzes. (16%) There will be eight quizzes on all course content, including vocabulary, grammar structures, reading and writing and language skills, with special emphasis on listening and talking. As language acquisition is a summative process, so each quiz will include chapter content as well as previously presented material. Tentative dates are indicated in the course schedule and may be changed as needed.
- All quizzes are taken online on Tuesday, and your instructor will send a reminder note before the quizzes.
- Students requiring special testing accommodations can take the exam at any place with a computer and Internet connection.
- Dates for the tests are indicated in the course schedule (Calendario).
- Once you start the quiz, the quiz will remain open for one hour and fifteen minutes (75 minutes) on the date of the exam. Do not try to take the exam at 11:00 pm, because it will drop you before you can finish. Do not leave it for the last minute.

Absence Policy

Regular class attendance, participation, and engagement in coursework are important contributors to student success. Absences may be excused as provided in the University of Houston <u>Undergraduate Excused Absence Policy</u> and <u>Graduate Excused Absence Policy</u> for reasons including: medical illness of student or close relative, death of a close family member, legal or government proceeding that a student is obligated to attend, recognized professional and educational activities where the student is presenting, and University-sponsored activity or athletic competition. On plagiarism

Plagiarism is a serious form of cheating. To plagiarize is to claim another's ideas or writing as one's own. **It is a form of stealing**.

Plagiarism can take several forms. Students often associate the term with writers who copy entire passages from a book, magazine, encyclopedia, or other printed source and turn them in to an instructor as their work. This is, perhaps, the most blatant form of plagiarism as well as the easiest for instructors to detect. After all, instructors can usually recognize a passage lifted from Time magazine or other sources with distinctive styles. In fact, instructors can almost always recognize professional writing, even if they cannot immediately identify its source.

But plagiarism takes several other forms. For instance, students plagiarize when they borrow ideas from others without giving them credit. In this case, students might not even use the other person's language; nevertheless, they are stealing the person's ideas or content. Students also plagiarize when they present another student's work (or the work of a professional paper writing service, or any material copied from a website) as their own. Thus, documentation involves more than just citing the source of direct quotations.

Because plagiarism is such a complex concept to come to grips with in its entirety, take note of the following summary definition:

- Plagiarism includes the literal repetition without acknowledgement of the writings of another author.
 All significant words, phrases, clauses or passages in a student's paper or presentation which have been taken directly from the source material must be enclosed in quotation marks and acknowledged either in the text itself or in foot or endnotes.
- Plagiarism includes borrowing without acknowledging another person's general plan, outline, or structure
 of argument in the creation of one's own organization.
- Plagiarism includes borrowing another's **ideas** and representing them as one's own. To **paraphrase** the thoughts of another writer, professor or classmate without acknowledging them is to plagiarize.
- Plagiarism also includes allowing any other person or organization (including those found on the Internet) to prepare a paper or assignment, and submitting it as one's own work.

Plagiarism in the course will not be tolerated. Penalties for plagiarism include, but are not limited to, failure in the course, suspension, and permanent expulsion from the university.
