


Conference Floorplan

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Conference Keynote

Dr. Tomikia P. LeGrande

President, Prairie View AQM University

Tomikia P. LeGrande, Ed.D., became the ninth president of Prairie View A&M University (PVAMU) on June 1, 2023. Her career in higher education is marked by successive leadership roles and professional achievements.

Before joining PVAMU, Dr. LeGrande served as vice president for strategy, enrollment management and student success at Virginia Commonwealth University, where she led the development and implementation of the university's strategic plan, priorities, and goals to influence national prominence, strategic partnerships, and student access and success. Other senior level leadership roles prior to VCU include vice president for student affairs and enrollment management at the University of Houston-Downtown, and associate vice chancellor for enrollment management at Winston Salem State University.



Throughout her career, Dr. LeGrande's focus has been on advancing equity, accessibility, and affordability in higher education. She works to create and sustain engaging and supportive cultures for faculty, staff and students resulting in positive institutional outcomes. She has been prolific in securing resources to support innovation and accelerate progress. In all of her career endeavors, Dr. LeGrande has created "cultures of care" utilizing her expertise in strategic planning, new technology implementation, change management, and policy and business process redesign. With a personalized approach, she engages at all levels of an organization-- forming, deploying and managing cross-organizational teams that find solutions to impediments that may impact university progress.

Dr. LeGrande is a sought-after thought leader, and a regular presenter and facilitator on the topics of enrollment management, educational equity and student success. A native of Savannah, GA, Dr. LeGrande earned a B.S. in chemistry from Savannah State University, M.S. in chemistry from North Carolina A&T State University, and an Ed.D. from Texas Tech University.

Return 2 Complete: A Path Toward Collaborative Student Reclamation BP

When picturing a prospective college student, the adolescent who recently graduated from high school is often the first image. However, UHD has a unique position, often serving the nontraditional student whose average age is twenty-eight years old. Supporting students in the transitional phase from young to middle adulthood presents a set of challenges that an eighteen-year-old does not typically face. These students often find themselves pursuing a career outcome that requires a college degree, yet lifestyle needs have impacted their ability to complete their education when they initially set out to do so after high school. UHD has embarked on a mission to lead a collaborative effort to reengage former UHD students who have some college credit but no credential. The aim is to uncover barriers and facilitate support for students toward graduation, particularly focusing on our unique adult learner population. Executing this initiative requires the development of a cross-campus team that facilitates each enrollment function. Additionally, it involves implementing survey systems to understand students' needs and serving as a liaison to connect them with readily available resources. This includes uncovering the ways in which current practices or policies may impact student degree completion.

According to the National Center for Education Statistics, 64% of students enrolled in college for the first time as an undergraduate student complete a bachelor's degree in six years (NCES, 2020). Hence, summer bridge programs are instituted to provide support and opportunities to undergird students transition from high school to their first-year in college. The main points of the session include the purpose of summer bridge programs, creating collaborative connections early, the importance of establishing meaningful connections with peers, staff, and faculty, and providing opportunities for social, cultural, and academic enrichment outside of the class.

The purpose of the secret shop is not to test for employee knowledge but rather to evaluate the customer service experience 1) Creating a secret shopper program focused on the customer experience 2) Identifying potential shoppers who can provide an objective evaluation 3) Evaluating each customer service area based on predetermined service expectations. 4) Collecting feedback from evaluators using a standard survey method and 5) Evaluating that feedback to identify training opportunities that will enhance the customer experience


