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Immigration Policy in a Polarized Era



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### **Executive Summary**

#### Approval Ratings for Handling the Border Policy

- Two out of three Texans disapprove of President Joe Biden's border policy, with 47% expressing strong disapproval.
- 85% of Republicans approve of Governor Greg Abbott's border policy, while 70% of Democrats disapprove of it.
- 86% of Texas Republicans disapprove of Joe Biden's border policy.

#### Terminology Preferences regarding Foreign Without Authorization

 Offensive terminology to refer to foreigners without authorization is preferred by a great portion of Republicans (72%) and Independents (59%), while a smaller percentage of Democrats (27%) also prefer such terms.

#### Support for Border Security Policies

- Repondents tend to support making illegal immigration a state crime, with 40.6% strongly backing this measure. This contrasts with the 27.2% who strongly support spending \$3.5 billion annually on border security.
- Republicans show higher support for making illegal immigration a state crime, with 64.5% strongly backing this policy, compared to only 16.6% of Democrats.

#### Concerns About Illegal Immigrant Voting

- A majority of Republicans are very concerned about illegal immigrant voting, with 55.4% expressing strong concern. In contrast, only 19.2% of Democrats share this level of concern.
- Among the Silent/Boomer generation, 52.4% are very concerned about illegal immigrant voting, compared to 28.2% of Millennials/Gen Z.

## Immigration Policy in a Polarized Era

### Introduction

Immigration policy is one of the most polarizing issues in American politics. It stands out as a salient, if not the most, in the current presidential campaign. The Republican Presidential candidate, former President Donald Trump, has expressed strong opinions on tightening immigration controls and enhancing border security.<sup>1</sup> Following Joe Biden's announcement of his withdrawal from the presidential race, the Democratic party has nominated Vice-President Kamala Harris as the party's standard bearer. VP Harris, who had been in charge of addressing the roots of immigration by engaging Central American governments, has more recently expressed support a bipartisan border security deal that has stalled in Congress <sup>2</sup>. While Harris's performance in office has been harshly criticized by the right, her change in stance towards immigration has drawn criticism from the left.

The State of Texas is at the center of ongoing policy debates on immigration. Due to its extensive border with Mexico, the historical cultural exchange between the two countries, and the cosmopolitan nature of its major cities, immigration policy remains a constant topic of discussion in Texas. Governor Greg Abbott has embraced Donald Trump's position and rhetoric on immigration in Texas, making this policy his mainstay. In a bill signed in December 2023, Abbott pushed to make illegal immigration a state crime <sup>3</sup>, thereby keeping immigration a hot topic in this election year.

In the backdrop of these heated political and policy debate we analyze the opinions, perceptions, attitudes, and policy support of Texans regarding immigration issues. The report is part of the **Texas Trends**, a series of survey-based analyses conducted by the Hobby School of Public Affairs at the University of Houston and the Executive Master of

Public Administration Program in the Barbara Jordan – Mickey Leland School of Public Affairs at Texas Southern University.

Our findings show that immigration policy in Texas is highly polarized along partisan lines. Evaluations of national and state immigration policies, support for various policies, concerns, and even the terminology used to refer to foreigners without authorization vary by party identification. Regarding policy preferences, while Republican respondents generally support more restrictive measures, Democrats are more inclined toward less restrictive policies. Similarly, we found generational differences, with younger respondents (Millennials and Gen Z) exhibiting more positive attitudes toward immigration and greater support for more inclusive policies.

#### How are Politicians Handling the Border Policy





Figure 1: Approval Ratings for Handling the Border Issue: Joe Biden vs. Greg Abbott

We first started by looking at the approval rates of President Joe Biden and Governor of Texas Greg Abbot in the way they are handling the border policy. The approval ratings for handling the border issue between Joe Biden and Greg Abbott are contrasting. Figure 1 shows that for Greg Abbott, 30.6% of respondents strongly approve of his handling of the border issue, while 26.1% somewhat approve, 13.2% somewhat disapprove, and 30.1% strongly disapprove. In comparison, Joe Biden's handling of the border issue has a lower approval rating, with 12.3% strongly approving and 24.0% somewhat approving. The disapproval ratings for Biden are higher, with 16.9% somewhat disapproving and a substantial 46.8% strongly disapproving.


**Figure 2:** Approval Ratings for Handling the Border Issue by Party Identification: Joe Biden vs. Greg Abbott

We further found differences in their responses according to the respondent party identification. Figure 2 shows that among Democrats, 26.9% strongly approve and 45.9% somewhat approve of Joe Biden, while 11.3% strongly approve and 19.5% somewhat approve of Greg Abbott. Almost seven out of ten Democrats (69.2%) somewhat or strongly disapprove of the way Abbot is handling the border.

For Republicans, only 5.2% strongly approve and 9.1% somewhat approve of Joe Biden, with 11.8% somewhat disapproving and almost three quarters (73.9%) strongly disapproving. Greg Abbott has 55.1% strong approval and 29.7% somewhat approval among Republicans, with 9.7% somewhat disapproving and 5.5% strongly disapproving. Independents show 4.5% strong approval and 20.5% somewhat approval for Joe Biden, while Greg Abbott has 24.1% strong approval and 29.1% somewhat approval. The disapproval ratings for Biden among Independents are 19.8% somewhat and 55.1% strongly, and for Abbott, 15.2% somewhat and 31.6% strongly.<sup>5</sup>

**Figure 3:** Approval Ratings for Handling the Border Issue by Racial/Ethnic Group: Joe Biden vs. Greg Abbott




Regarding racial and ethnic contrasts, Figure **3** shows the racial and ethnic contrasts in the approval ratings. Among Whites, 10.9% strongly approve and 19.6% somewhat approve of Joe Biden, while 16.2% somewhat disapprove and 53.2% strongly disapprove. For Greg Abbott, 36.7% strongly approve and 29% somewhat approve, with 11.1% somewhat disapproving and 23.1% strongly disapproving. Among Blacks, Joe Biden has 20.9% strong approval and 46% somewhat approval, with 17.3% somewhat disapproving and 15.9% strongly disapproving. Greg Abbott has 18.2% strong approval and 20.7% somewhat approval among Blacks, with 15.2% somewhat disapproving and 45.9% strongly disapproving. Among Hispanics, Joe Biden's approval ratings are 11.9% strong approval and 24.5% somewhat approval, while 18.9% somewhat disapprove and 44.7% strongly disapprove. Greg Abbott has 23.4% strong approval and 20.7% somewhat approval among Hispanics, with 16.1% somewhat disapproving and 39.8% strongly disapproving. For the group classified as Others, Joe Biden has 8.9% strong approval and 18.4% somewhat approval, with 14.3% somewhat disapproving and almost six out of

for Biden. For support for Abbott, they accounted for 10.17% of responses for Democrats, 6.97% for Republicans, and 16.76% for Independents. The complete table with percentages can be found in the appendix.

ten respondents (58.4%) strongly disapproving. Greg Abbott has 32% strong approval and 33% somewhat approval among Others, with 15.8% somewhat disapproving and 19.2% strongly disapproving.<sup>6</sup>

**Figure 4:** Approval Ratings for Handling the Border Issue by Age Group: Joe Biden vs. Greg Abbott




We also found differences in their responses according to the respondent age group. Figure 4 shows the approval ratings for Joe Biden and Greg Abbott on handling the border issue among Silent/Boomer, Gen X, and Millennial/Gen Z age groups. Among the Silent/Boomer group, 7.5% strongly approve and 21.7% somewhat approve of Joe Biden, while 9% somewhat disapprove and 61.9% strongly disapprove. For Greg Abbott, 42.3% strongly approve and 17.4% somewhat approve, with 8.2% somewhat disapproving and 32.1% strongly disapproving. Among Gen X, Joe Biden has 12.2% strong approval and 23.3% somewhat approval, with 15.1% somewhat disapproving and almost half of this age group (49.4%) strongly disapproving. Greg Abbott has 31.5% strong approval

and 23.3% somewhat approval among Gen X, with 12.8% somewhat disapproving and 32.4% strongly disapproving. Among the Millennial/Gen Z group, Joe Biden's approval ratings are 15.3% strong approval and 25.8% somewhat approval, while 23.0% somewhat disapprove and 36.0% strongly disapprove. Greg Abbott has 22.1% strong approval and 33.5% somewhat approval among Millennials/Gen Z, with 16.9% somewhat disapproving and 27.5% strongly disapproving.<sup>7</sup>

In addition, we found differences in the support for the way Abbott and Biden are handling the border by area. Figure 5 shows that support varies significantly across different regions. For the way Abbott is handling the border, in Dallas Fort Worth, 60.5% strongly or somewhat support. In Houston, 53.3% strongly or somewhat support, followed by San Antonio at 58.8%, Austin at 48.7%, and South Texas at 41.8%. The lowest support is in all other counties, with 60.9% strongly or somewhat supporting. In contrast, for the way Biden is handling the border, in Dallas Fort Worth, 42.1% strongly or somewhat support. In Houston, 34.9% strongly or somewhat support, followed by Austin at 47.9%, San Antonio at 31.3%, South Texas at 34.9%, and all other counties at 28.6%. Overall, the data indicates that Abbott receives higher support for his handling of the border compared to Biden across all regions surveyed.<sup>8</sup>

### **Terminology About Foreigners Without Authorization**


We further asked Texans about their everyday language preferences. Specifically, we asked respondents about their preferred terminology to refer to foreigners without authorization. We included five options in our survey: *undocumented immigrants*, *unauthorized immigrants*, *immigrants*, *illegal immigrants*, and *illegal alien*. According to Lois Parkinson Zamora, Moore Professor of English at the University of Houston, the first, second, and third terms are accurate, but the last two are offensive. Professor Zamora stated, "*Like all pejorative terms for minority groups, they are demeaning to the group. Less offensive words help speakers and listeners to accept the group as such: a minority group that has its own challenges.*"

When we analyzed the responses, we found partisan differences in the preferred terminology. While 27% of respondents who identified as Democrats preferred the offensive terms, 59% of independents, and 72% of Republicans favored that kind of terminology. This contrast is not surprising to Professor Zamora: "*The political parties in the U.S. are polarized on the issue of immigration, so the prejudices of those against immigration are naturally reflected in their language.*"<sup>9</sup>



We also found differences in terminology for unauthorized immigrants according to respondent age group. Figure 6 shows the preferred terminology among Silent/Boomer, Gen X, and Millennial/Gen Z age groups. Among the Silent/Boomer group, 63.7% prefer pejorative terms (*Illegal Immigrant* and *Illegal Alien*). Among Gen X, 50.4% prefer offensive terms. Among the Millennial/Gen Z group, 45.5% prefer offensive terms.<sup>10</sup>



### **Support For Policies**

What type of border policies do Texans support? Figure 7 shows the support for two border security policies among respondents. The first policy is *spending \$3.5 billion in Texas tax dollars annually on border security*, which has 27.2% strongly supporting, 34.5% somewhat supporting, 20.5% somewhat opposing, and 17.8% strongly opposing. The second policy is making illegal immigration a state crime and empowering Texas law enforcement to arrest illegal immigrants, which has 40.6% strongly supporting, 21.3% somewhat supporting, 17.2% somewhat opposing, and 20.9% strongly opposing.<sup>11</sup>





Figure 8: Support for Border Security Policies By Party Identification

When analyzing the data by party identifications, we found differences in support for border security policies. For *spending \$3.5 billion on border security* (top panel of Figure 8), among Democrats, 13.4% strongly support, 31.7% somewhat support, 27.8% somewhat oppose, and 27% strongly oppose. Among Republicans, 43.3% strongly support, 39.1% somewhat support, 12.8% somewhat oppose, and 4.9% strongly oppose. Among Independents, 28.7% strongly support, 31.5% somewhat support, 18.4% somewhat oppose, and 21.5% strongly oppose.

For the policy of *making illegal immigration a state crime and empowering Texas law enforcement to arrest illegal immigrants* (bottom panel of Figure 8), among Democrats, 16.6% strongly support, 19.8% somewhat support, 26.1% somewhat oppose, and 37.5% strongly oppose. Among Republicans, 64.5% strongly support, 23.1% somewhat

support, 8% somewhat oppose, and 4.4% strongly oppose. Among Independents, 43.2% strongly support, 19.6% somewhat support, 15% somewhat oppose, and 21.1% strongly oppose.<sup>12</sup>


### **Public Concerns About Illegal Immigrants Voting**

Finally, Figure 9 illustrates public concerns about illegal immigrant voting, broken down by party identification. Among Democrats, 19.2% are very concerned, 27.1% are somewhat concerned, 16.6% are not too concerned, and 37.1% are not at all concerned. Among Republicans, 55.4% are very concerned, 27.1% are somewhat concerned, 13.6% are not too concerned, while 3.9% are not at all concerned. Among Independents, 39.7%

are very concerned, 16.8% are somewhat concerned, 20.4% are not too concerned, and 24.9% are not at all concerned.<sup>13</sup>




Figure 10: Concerns About Illegal Immigrant Voting in Texas Elections by Age Group

Similarly, we found generational differences in concerns about illegal immigrant voting in Texas elections. Figure 10 shows these concerns among Silent/Boomer, Gen X, and Millennial/Gen Z age groups. Among the Silent/Boomer group, 52.4% are very concerned, 16.5% are somewhat concerned, 9.9% are not too concerned, and 21.3% are not at all concerned. Among Gen X, 43.1% are very concerned, 21.4% are somewhat concerned, 14% are not too concerned, and 21.5% are not at all concerned. Finally, among the Millennial/Gen Z group, the levels of concern seem to be lower. 28.2% of Millennials and Gen Z are very concerned, 28.5% are somewhat concerned, 22.2% are not too concerned, and 21.1% are not at all concerned.<sup>14</sup>

### Conclusion

The findings from the Texas Trends Survey 2024 regarding immigration and border control provide readers with a clear picture of the diverse opinions, preferences, and attitudes of the respondents. Our report presents a detailed view of how Texans perceive one of the most pressing issues in the state, reflecting the diversity and contrasting positions within Texans.

Our study, based on a survey conducted during a presidential election year, shows that immigration is a highly polarized topic among Texans. The largest contrasts we found in our data were based on the party identification of the respondents. We also found differences between age groups and geographies; however, those differences were not as significant as those related to partisanship.

While national and state candidates are still defining their strategies for the forthcoming electoral campaign, they cannot ignore what the voters have to say. Texans hold diverse opinions on immigration and border control, with those opinions differing by party affiliation, age, and area. Understanding these dynamics is essential for candidates as they navigate this contentious issue in the lead-up to future elections.

## **Technical Appendix**

The Texas Trends Survey is a five-year survey project to study Texas's changing population launched in 2021 by the Hobby School of Public Affairs at the University of Houston and the Executive Master of Public Administration Program in the Barbara Jordan – Mickey Leland School of Public Affairs at Texas Southern University.

This is fourth survey in the series and fielded between June 20 and July 1, 2024. The survey was conducted in English and Spanish, with 2,257 YouGov respondents 18 years of age and older (including an oversample of Black Texans), resulting in a confidence interval of  $\pm/-2.1$  for the overall survey population and  $\pm/-2.5$  for the sub-population of 1,484 likely voters.

Survey respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race/ethnicity, and education and are representative of the Texas adult population.
