ADVANCED DEGREE FOCUS

The College of Nursing's advanced degree programs are growing for the good of our students' future patients. In its report on the future of nursing, the Health and Medicine Division of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine issued a call to action for 80 percent of nurses to earn a BSN degree or higher by year 2020, as well as doubling the number of nurses holding doctoral degrees.

STATE-OF-THE-ART RESOURCES

The College of Nursing's home at the UH Sugar Land Campus is less than a decade old, and students also have collaborative opportunities and class options at the University of Houston, including the new Health and Biomedical Sciences Building II. Courses will also be available at the UH Katy Campus. One notable resource is the Methodist Sugar Land Hospital Nursing Simulation Center, an interprofessional, hospital-based center, providing hands-on clinical simulation training to improve patient safety and patient care.

EXCELLENCE IN DIVERSITY

Here, diversity and excellence are not mutually exclusive. Winners of the inaugural 2016 Health Professions HEED (Higher Education Excellence in Diversity) Award by INSIGHT Into Diversity magazine, 'Graduating nurses with a bachelor's degree or above has been one of the driving missions of UH's nursing program. Evidence shows having a higher percentage of nurses with a bachelor's degree caring for people in hospitals results in better patient outcomes, as measured by nurse-quality indicators such as fewer deaths, infections and falls." — Dean Kathryn Tart

"I wanted to expand my knowledge in this subject," she says, "and one day help families fight chronic conditions that can be managed or prevented with a healthy diet."

Now, she is doing exactly that. Her experiences prompted her to pursue a degree in human nutrition and food from the University of Houston, and her desire to make a difference led her to her next step: nursing.

The first in her family to pursue higher education, Machuca is enrolled in the Second Degree BSN 12-month intensive program at the University of Houston College of Nursing. She comes to the program armed with experience in scholarly research as part of a team that investigated childhood obesity and nutrition, ultimately publishing their findings in Public Health Nursing.

The experience, she said, taught her new skills and helped to guide her career path. She aims to become an emergency room nurse providing assessment and treatment to patients at their most vulnerable state.

"A long term goal of mine is to give back to my community," she says, "and one day expand it outside the U.S. borders by developing health programs to provide primary, secondary and tertiary prevention care to individuals who do not have access to health care."
