(1)WELCOME CENTER

STUDENT CENTER SOUTH

M.D. ANDERSON LIBRARY (b)

This is the main library on campus. Here, you'll have access to limitless physical and digital volumes, study rooms, and computers. It also houses the Honors College, which offers smaller classes and an emphasis on critical thinking and reading.

BUTLER PLAZA (7)

Butler Plaza is our designated free speech zone, allowing students to express their first amendment rights, and making it a great place for conversations about theological, political, and philosophical ideas. The beautiful tower in the middle, the Tower of Cheyenne, often becomes the center of many student led events.

(8) CULLEN FAMILY PLAZA

A.D. BRUCE RELIGION CENTER
