COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Class Participation: This course is offered in a modified seminar format, which means the majority of class time will be spent in discussion of assigned readings and related activities. Students are responsible for completing the readings each week and being prepared to participate in class. Participation will involve expression of thoughtful opinions based on a careful reading of the text chapters, consideration of personal life experiences or current events, and attention to in-class and at-home assignments. Participation also includes listening to others and considering viewpoints and experiences that may differ from one's own. Class members share responsibility for maintaining an atmosphere of mutual respect and professional collegiality. Contributions to class discussions and activities will make up a portion (10%) of the course grade. Periodic quizzes and independent classroom assignments also will contribute (10%) toward the overall grade. Although some conflicts with class hours may occur, a pattern of late arrivals, early departures, or absences will adversely affect class participation. Please note: No classroom activities will involve the use of laptops, cell phones, recording equipment or other electronic devices. Such items, as well as materials for other courses, are a distraction to others and should not be used in class.

Reading/Writing Assignments: In this writing intensive course, a series of essay assignments will take the place of major exams and provide the primary basis (80%) for determining final grades. The course outline lists nine due dates for papers, but only <u>seven are required</u>. As indicated on the schedule, a project involving a museum visit will result in a required paper that will take the place of a final exam. Papers are due on the dates indicated, and should be printed and submitted at the beginning of the class period, and posted at Turnitin.com. Papers submitted after the due date will incur a loss of points, and no late papers will be discussed in class. Each of the individual papers should represent your own work and should not be copied in entirety or in part from any print or electronic media. Students are expected to abide by the academic honesty policies detailed in the UH Student Handbook:
